Rationale

- The restrictions imposed by the coronavirus pandemic changed the patterns in instruction and collaboration.
- Because of the different ways that students were generally affected by the 'isolation', we agreed to connect our students with their peers in another institution to discuss how different topical issues affected them.
- The inter-university online discussions between the <u>American University of Nigeria</u> (AUN) and the <u>American</u> <u>University of Central Asia (AUCA)</u> were initiated as a student-centered educational forum which connects the community of learners from our institutions beyond classroom instruction.
- This is to encourage constructive critical discussions about topical matters to promote an understanding of values, belief systems, perspectives, visions and approaches that reflect the respective motherlands, customs, traditions and principles represented in the participants.

Considerations for the Virtual Discussion

The Virtual Discussion collaboration included the following:

- (a) Pre-discussion faculty deliberations and consultations with students
- (b) Connections with peers and active preparations
- (c) The discussion
- (d) Post-discussion reports and evaluations

Pre-discussion faculty deliberations and consultations with students

- Prior to giving the assignment to students, the faculty agreed on the topic and the timing of the virtual event.
- The target topic had to be connected to the two syllabi and the interests of the participating students.
- The selected topic could be determined by the faculty or group monitors' correspondence, which is rather time-consuming. In our case, it took us up to 3 weeks to determine the topics.
- Students were to be divided into groups for icebreaker email introductions prior to the event.
- Post-discussion surveys would be distributed after the event.

Connections with Peers and Active Preparations

- At AUN, students were encouraged to introduce themselves via email to their peers and also conduct independent research using the library's database and any other credible information sources to build their reading, academic writing and critical thinking skills.
- At AUCA, the discussion was connected to their term paper or Video Project and while preparing for the assignment each student was assigned for individual consultations via the teacher's "Personal Meeting room" on Zoom. Students were introduced to the basics of interview. They created a questionnaire with the help of GFs. In addition to the core texts that students discussed in class, it was important for the faculty to guide the students in searching for other materials and post them on the e-course. Sources included scientific articles, documentaries, movies, or other fiction stories related to the topic. To check the students' preparedness, there were debates on post-colonialism and its values.
- Guidelines were also provided on how students should watch, read, and gather the material and there were prompts on which notes to take and what leading questions to answer during this process. Questions included: Who is the main character, where does the action take place, what is the main idea of the text/ documentary? What connection does the main idea have with your own research paper? What is the most surprising/shocking episode in the movie/article and why is this so? In what part of your research paper are you are going to use it and why?
- For fluency in communication students also practiced using transitional phrases and sentence starters to agree with a previous speaker, express polite disagreement or ask a clear question. Students who needed support were encouraged to make reference to a designated handout during the online event.

Active Preparations Ctd.

- In a subsequent arrangement at AUCA, depending on the personal skillsets students wished to enhance during the discussions, students were given <u>specific roles</u>:
- Those willing to develop their leadership skills were assigned as hosts and guided on how to lead and record a discussion.
- Students willing to interview their peers from the collaborating university prepared the questionnaire and studied how based on the topic of interest to conduct an interview for research Video Project (see Ayana Sharsheeva's Video Project on Sexual Harassment)
- Those with anxieties about engaging with new people for the first time were encouraged to prepare questions, read them at the meeting and respond to the questions asked.
- Volunteers interested in hands-on movie-making skills were asked to introduce their native country by creating 1-2 minute long videos, e.g. (Daria Bajdakova – The Kyrgyz Republic), Gulrukhsor Vanjieva – AUCA)
- Students interested in writing had the option to express themselves through poetry, or essays that met newspaper article standards (Bolot Bekturganov)


The Discussion Part 1

- As the international virtual discussions conducted between two universities in different countries, the hosts presented themselves, guests of the discussion, and their respective students before playing promotional videos about their countries and universities. While the videos were taken from the main websites of both universities, students were encouraged to create their own introductory videos.
- During the virtual discussion, students were encouraged to set their short-term goal, take notes and ask pertinent questions for clarification of ideas/cultural contexts, further discussion or follow-up essays to get extra points. (See Handout 1 "Questions to keep in mind during the discussion or text annotation")

The Discussion Part 2

- Breakout rooms were created to simulate the AMICAL 'unconference' idea.
- Students were given the options to move from one room to the other and contribute to the discourse on different contemporary topics that youth either witness, read about or can identify with on a personal level. This gave the AUCA students the opportunity to get firsthand information from their peers for their respective research papers.
- Links to related Google Form questionnaires were shared with AUN students



What do you think do women have the same rights in Kyrgyzstan or in your country compare to men ?



Post-discussion reflections and evaluations

- At AUN, the class reflected on the experience and then wrote reflection papers to assess their note-taking, notemaking, listening, paraphrasing and academic writing skills. One essay was chosen for publication in AUNthisWEEK, the university's weekly newsletter.
- At AUCA, the faculty gave post-discussion options: participation in the online follow-up forum posted on the ecourse; writing a 500-word argumentative/compare and contrast essay related to the international virtual event; writing a newspaper article for publication in the AUCA *NewStar* student newspaper; or producing a video about the event. (Rubrics and peer review forms to essay types and a self- assessment were provided)





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
