



Re-envisioning Information Literacy for the 21st century: A New Hybrid Course Model at AUC

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The Historical Evolution of LALT

- Began in early 2000s
- Part of AUC's core curriculum for all students (graduation requirement)
- Pass/Fail Course
- From Fully In-Person to Fully Online in Spring 2020
- Format: Short topical lecture followed by individual and small group activities, which directly apply the lesson.
 - Final Exam Week 15





New Course Vision

Reinforces the Liberal Arts Curriculum

Reasserts the significance of LALT within the First Year Program (FYP)

Focuses on fundamentals and student needs (including those with disabilities)

Awareness of the AUC Library, its resources, and their impact on student academic success



Highlights: Overall Changes

From a 15-week model to <u>10 weeks + consultations</u>
75 min. sessions instead of 50 min.
Integrated 21st century skills into the course
Modified course description

 Practicum instead of final exam (librarian consultations / practical application of skills)

Focus on student needs: enhance the AUC experience and Quality of Education (AUC strategic plan)



Content Changes

Maintain core library research skills (catalog, databases, citations, etc.), but add the following:

- Greater student awareness of course purpose and application (personal lives, studies, careers post-AUC)
- Orient students to broader concept of IL within a liberal arts context
- Ethical use of information, critical thinking skills, etc.
- Digital literacy skills needed in the 21st century

Format Changes

✤ 15 week, fully online for Academic Year 2020-2021

- 10 weeks + 5 weeks of librarian consultations that culminates with a practicum (in lieu of a final)
- Hybrid course partially in person, partially online (exploring Dual Delivery option for Fall 2021)
- Emphasis on practice and practical application tied to the learning outcomes.





Challenges for Fall 2021

Number of students per class (with 18 sections)
Number of instructors for the course
Ongoing flexibility: In-person vs. online
Facilities / Space Availability (social distancing)
